Dear Friends.

When I was in seminary, the sermons that we presented were judged by a specific criterion: did they include the Good News? For the professors, that question meant, did they provide hope? At the time, I thought it an unfair question. Along with the other students in seminary, I had

never thought that we were called into the ministry to make people feel good; we were needed to convict people of their sinfulness and turn them into better Christians. The purpose of our call was not to make people feel better, but to please God.

I looked at writing sermons as an academic exercise. When I did my undergraduate and graduate work in Literature, Linguistics, and Philosophy, writing was not to simplify concepts, but to provide avenues to inspire thought. Everything that I wrote was crafted to be read; now I had to learn how to write so that people could understand me through listening. At the same time, I had to learn how to interpret the scriptures that I was using as the base of my sermon. The professors were going against what I had been taught in college. Then I was to work so that the interpretations were my own; now, I was to be bound to how the professors interpreted the scriptures.

In time, as a pastor and preacher in the church, I have come to understand what they were asking; we were not to interpret scripture with either our own or the professor's interpretation, but to offer Jesus's interpretation of scripture. I also learned that preaching to convict someone of their sins is a fool's errand. Every time someone has ever told me that they felt guilty because of something that I said in a sermon, it was something I did not know that I was preaching about. In other words, it was the work of the Holy Spirit, and never my sermon.

While I preach two sermons every Sunday, my best sermons are never from the pulpit. They are the relational sermons that we share with each other. It is the same with interpretation of scriptures. Ministry comes more through experience and relationships than by being told what to do by professors or reading textbooks. I have found that while we can learn how to interpret Jesus's words through books and scholarly writings, we find the sharpest interpretations through relationships with others. If I want to share the Good News with you, sermons are certainly important, but not if those sermons are not connected to our relationships with each other. I understand grace because I share pain with you. I understand the experience of abiding in Christ because I share experiences with you.

You do not have to be a minister or go to seminary into order to learn to interpret the Good News; you only need to allow yourself to be in relationship with other people. Other people can verify the work and presence of God in our lives in a way that we cannot do on our own. Family, friends and fellow church members can see God through us. That is the message that God sent to us through Jesus – that God is with us (Emmanuel).

In one way, in seminary, I learned that preaching the Gospel is not preaching the deep meanings of the words of the Bible. In another way, in ministry, I have discovered that if I am to preach the Gospel, I must delve into the deeper meanings only found in shared experiences.

A word of advice; if you come to church infrequently, and you do not get to know the people worshipping with you, you may truly be missing out on the great joy of Jesus's teaching. Because, ultimately, the Bible removed from people, is only a volume of lifeless words on dry paper. If you would know the excitement of the Good News, come share it with us, if not on Sunday then at one of our Bible Studies. The Bible alone will not laugh with you like we will; the words in the book will not share your sorrow like we will. All in all, when you mix the words of the Bible into a group of people, the Good News will always come alive.

The deer, the horse, the great eagle, these are our brothers ... the earth is our mother.


Whatever befalls the earth befalls the sons (and daughters) of the earth.




Tuesdays with the Pastor—Misreading Scripture with Western Eyes— What was clear to the original readers of Scripture is not always

clear to us. Because of the cultural distance between the biblical world and our contemporary setting, we often bring modern Western biases to the text. For example: When Western readers hear Paul exhorting women to "dress modestly," we automatically think in terms of sexual modesty. But most women in that culture would never wear racy clothing. The context suggests that Paul is likely more concerned about *economic* modesty--that Christian women not flaunt their wealth through expensive clothes, braided hair and gold jewelry.

Biblical scholars Brandon O'Brien and Randy Richards shed light on the ways that Western readers often misunderstand the cultural dynamics of the Bible. They identify nine key areas where modern Westerners have significantly different assumptions about what might be going on in a text. Getting beyond our own cultural assumptions is increasingly important for being Christians in our interconnected and globalized world. Learn to read Scripture as a member of the global body of Christ.

Women's Fellowship Bible Study—*Experiencing Contagious Joy*, by Christa Kinde. Joy has a way of working its way from the inside out. When our lives are filled with joy, the symptoms are unmistakable. A twinkle in the eye, a ready smile, a skip in our step, a song in the heart. Joy lends a glow to the face and a lift to the voice. It is also the birthright of every believer. But rainy days have a way of distracting us from that fact. In this study, readers will take a careful look at this uniquely Christian characteristic and discover they have every reason to be joyful.





Bible and Brew— Do you have questions about your faith, the Bible, the church or Christianity? Write them down and bring them to the study. For September, we will have a free-wheeling discussion about some of the questions we have always had—questions that don't always seem to get answered.



An American Conscience The Reinhold Niebuhr Story by Martin Doblmeier

Reinhold Niebuhr (1892–1971) was an inner-city pastor, an ethics professor, the author of the famous Serenity Prayer, and ordained in the United Church of Christ.

Time magazine's 25th anniversary issue in March 1948 featured

Niebuhr on its cover, and *Time* later eulogized him as "the greatest Protestant theologian in America since Jonathan Edwards." Cited as an influence by public figures ranging from Billy Graham to Barack Obama, Niebuhr was described by historian Arthur Schlesinger Jr. as "the most influential American theologian of the twentieth century." We will study his life and thought and its impact on theology and politics today.

Movies with Meaning

The Hollars, written by James C. Strouse and directed by John Krasinski, is a simple and familiar story brought vividly and beautifully by a cast of immensely talented actors who find every touching nuance of their characters and relax into them with authenticity and honesty and with such warmth and affection that the film's 88-minute running time feels like a mere cinematic blip.

The story centers around John Hollar (Krasinski), a struggling New York City artist suddenly forced to navigate the smalltown ways he'd long ago left behind when his mother, played with her typical perfection by Margo Martindale, is struck by a serious illness that rocks the entire family including Ron (Sharlto Copley), her divorced son who lives in the basement, and husband Don (Richard Jenkins), whose business is simultaneously about to go under.

The film works precisely because this ensemble cast acts like an ensemble. They find the authenticity in the relationships, the right touches of humor in the humanity, and a surprising degree of sweetness that elevates The Hollars above its familiarity and formula and into the realm of that rare dramedy that leaves you satisfied with the journey and appreciative of the time you've had with the family.

Tutoring Update




I'm not a big fan of September. September is the month of the last celebration of summer, Labor Day, and the beginning of school. It spells the end of summer fun.

VOTING

With the **Midterm Election** coming in just over 2 months, on **November 6**, there might be some question about voting in Illinois, either for yourself or for others you know.

Rand VIII Here are some facts:

- Voter must be a US citizen, and must have resided in their precinct for 30 days. Must be 18 on or before election day.
- You can register AT the following places during the regular registration period, which closes October 8. After that date, locations are more limited.

Office of County Clerks Election Commissioners

Precinct Committees Schools

Military Recruitment Driver's License Facilities

Municipalities Public Libraries

Department of Employment Security

Department of Healthcare and Family Services

Online voter registration can be done at ova.Elections.il.gov.

You need 2 forms of identification (one with your current address). In 2017, Illinois passed Automatic Voter Registration when you visit the DMV and other similar facilities.

To check to see if you are registered, visit www.elections.il.gov/VotingInformation/register.aspx.

- Illinois permits early voting with ID, and registration PRIOR to 10/23.
- Illinois permits absentee voting for anyone.
- Voters are generally not required to show ID on Election Day
- While in prison for a felony, one cannot vote. But voting rights are reinstated after release.
