WELCOME PASTOR JIM BENZING

Welcoming a Servant Leader: The Ministry of Pastor James Benzing

We are blessed to introduce Pastor James Benzing, a man whose life and ministry are defined by a simple, powerful guiding principle: *"We must pray as if it all depends upon God and act as if it all depends upon us."*

A Foundation of Faith and Service

A native of Wapakoneta, Ohio, James's journey began at St. John United Church of Christ. From his early days in Sunday School to earning the rank of Eagle Scout in Troop 131, James developed a heart for "servant leadership." This calling led him to Heidelberg University and later to Eden Theological Seminary, where he was ordained in 1987.

For Pastor James, the ministry isn't just the job of one person at the pulpit—it is the calling of the entire congregation. He views his role as an "enabler," helping every member discover their own unique call to serve God's world.

A Legacy of Care

Throughout his career, James has served numerous communities across Illinois, including:

- St. John's UCC (Granite City), where he met his wife of 35 years, Deborah.
- Christ Memorial Church (Blue Island), where they welcomed their daughter, Rachel.
- Congregational Church of Algonquin, Immanuel UCC of Bartlett, and First Congregational Church of Carpentersville.

Beyond the church walls, James has served as an on-call chaplain at Advocate Sherman Hospital, providing comfort to those in their most vulnerable moments.

An Active Retirement

Though he "officially" retired in 2015, James remains a vital force in the Chicagoland area. He is a highly sought-after supply preacher and a beloved substitute teacher in local schools. Whether he is guiding a congregation through a transition or helping a student in the classroom, his charismatic energy and "contagious" kindness are always on display.

When he isn't serving the community, you can find James rooting for the St. Louis Cardinals, lost in a good book, or enjoying time with his family and dogs.



NEW & IMPROVED PASTORAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE



Because we as a church acknowledge the importance of a healthy relationship between the pastor and the congregation, the council has determined this is an opportune time during our transition to a settled pastor to re-establish this committee. And we've already started! The deacons nominated Anna Benjamin (chair), Nancy Kneip, and Bill Hellyer to serve, who were approved by the Church Council.

We started with an exit interview with Pastor Bob, combined with guidance from him on how a pastoral relations committee should function. The committee will meet regularly with the pastor and create a relationship that is based on friendship and trust. When the pastor has new ideas they may want to implement with the agreement of council, we can help provide introduction and support for them. If there are issues the pastor is concerned about, we can help to resolve them.

Likewise, when a member wants to come to us for a change they would like to see, or even a direct conflict they have, we will be responsible for working with them and the pastor to resolve this. To help make this an easier process, the committee is working on a form for the person to fill out to explain what the issue is, who is bringing the issue, and what the expected resolution may be.

This is all in beginning stages, and we will continue to look for guidance from Pastor Jim as well as suggestions from others. We look forward to new, improved pastoral relations!




WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP
